

Disasters and Catastrophes Reference List

Disclaimers:

1. This is a fairly raw data dump from my Endnote reference database. It is entirely possible that the search terms I used will yield odd results, like the "crisis" in elderly nutrition or things like that. This is because this database is a list of just about everything I have every cited or looked up. So it's pretty rough.
2. There may well be many typographical and spelling errors. And some of citations may not be in perfect order. This is intended to serve as a finding aid. Of course, if you'd like to point out errors, feel free!
3. Most of these sources are available at the NCSU library, although older material may not be in electronic format. For materials not at NC State (such as the *International Journal of Mass Emergencies and Disasters*) you should do an interlibrary loan request, which is surprisingly quick. I might also have the article you need, but I prefer you look to ILL first.
4. There are two basic parts to this list. First is a subject list; please keep in mind that if something falls into more than one subject it will fall under that heading, such as "crisis hurricane" or something like that.

The second part is a fairly complete index of key disaster journals. These are listed by journal and by author.

5. Not all of your interests will be reflected here. I don't know as much as I should about response, about the military role in response, about law enforcement, etc. And I do have some really odd stuff in here, like how the courts respond to disasters. It's a mixed bag, but might be useful.
6. The best way to use this document is to use the *find* function in Adobe Acrobat to search on terms of interest in the titles, like "earthquake" or "evacuation."
7. I'd be happy to provide anyone my Endnote database, although I will probably provide it very raw, with all my references in it, including materials entirely unrelated to disasters! But if you use Endnote, I am happy to provide my database.

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
